

Can I just say.....

The Gospel that we hear today, all about the man we often know as 'Doubting Thomas, always reminds me of that 'back-to-school' feeling. I can recall often hearing that read at Mass and thinking about what homework I'd need to do, if not for the day after then certainly for that coming week. I can also remember hearing that Gospel with bags packed and being ready to set off once again back to university. Those memories have always affected the way I approach that Gospel reading. But will it stir up the same feelings this year? This year, it's not back to school this week, at least not normal school in a classroom that isn't also a bedroom or living room. Will it be back to work? Again, it may not be back to work as normal for so many this week. We might be wondering if things will ever be the same again.

I think Jesus' first disciples will have had just those feelings, wondering if their lives would ever be the same again, following Our Lord's Resurrection and certainly after the Holy Spirit came upon them at Pentecost. I'm sure that they, like us at the moment, would have had many questions but not many answers. It's right that when things seem to be going wrong and when we struggle, we ask where God is in all this and also ask for his help. But when things are going right how ready are we to thank God for those times, for allowing the power of the risen Christ to be seen and felt in our lives? How ready were those first disciples of Jesus, I wonder?

In the Acts of the Apostles, our guide in this Easter Season, we see a young Church, the earliest Church, alive with that power of the Risen Christ and with the Holy Spirit. It's a Church that was filled with the excitement of the unknown, it seems, as they joyfully grew in number, but also one that seemed lacking in certainty, as great trials and persecutions befell those Christians young in their faith. Now, there are places in the world that know this sort of persecution even today and we must keep them in our prayers. We might say too that there are different forms of persecution, of a more subtle but no less effective form. Surely though, as we in these days celebrate the power of the Resurrection in our lives, now is the time to show our solidarity with all who struggle and suffer, in whatever way and with whatever faith or none. As we struggle on like the characters of the Acts of the Apostles with few answers but joy in our faith, let the light of the Risen Christ help us to affirm Jesus as my Lord and my God.

A message from the Safeguarding Department of the Archdiocese of Liverpool

"The coronavirus (COVID19) outbreak is going to have an impact on everyone's daily lives, as the government and the NHS take necessary steps to manage the outbreak, reduce transmission and treat those who need medical attention. It may be difficult, but by following guidance on social distancing, or staying at home, you are helping to protect yourself, your family, the NHS and your community. During this time, you may be bored, frustrated or lonely. You may also feel low, worried, anxious, or be concerned about your health or that of those close to you. Everyone reacts differently to events and changes in the way that we think, feel and behave vary between different people and over time. It's important that you take care of your mind as well as your body and to get further support if you need it." (Government, 2020)

Many thanks from Deacon Paul and Fr Joe for remembering us at Easter with your prayers, cards and gifts.

Over the weekend, the government launched its **#YouAreNotAlone** domestic abuse campaign to reassure victims of domestic abuse that there is still help for them during the Covid crisis, and that the household isolation instruction as a result of COVID-19 does not apply if you need to leave your home to escape domestic abuse.

The most important message is:

If you are in immediate danger, call 999 and ask for the police - the police will continue to respond to emergency calls.

If you call 999 from a mobile and cannot speak, press 55 to <u>Make Yourself Heard</u> (link embedded to scheme) and this will transfer your call to the police. Pressing 55 only works on mobiles and does not allow police to track your location.
