Can I just say....

The Ascension of Our Lord marks the culmination of Christ's mission on earth and marks the beginning of the apostles' mission to all nations. The apostles and disciples are to spread to the entire world what Our Lord accomplished in his human life on the Earth. This is how God has planned our salvation. Essentially, our task is to communicate the divine life of God, through Baptism, and to instruct those we meet in the ways of Christian life. This is what makes the Ascension so important: we are now to act in persona Christi, to take the place of the physically absent Christ in the world and make him visible and audible through our earthly lives. But if we're to do all this doing, all this action, taking Christ to the world, hadn't we better get in touch a bit with that Christ? This time of year only really goes to show the importance of prayer for all Jesus' followers. That's what we see the apostles do in the first reading we hear today, immediately after Our Lord ascending to heaven, joining in continuous prayer. They don't do it alone either. They're joined by several women and Mary, the Mother of the Lord, is mentioned – an example for us too in the month of May.

And that's, I think, how we should see this in-between time, this strange sort of time between the feast of the Ascension and the feast of Pentecost. It's a time for praying: the time of the original novena, nine days of praying, in imitation of the apostles. We're praying that the Holy Spirit will come afresh on us all. We need this Holy Spirit so that we too can share in the mission Christ had and which he passed on to the apostles. We can't be tempted just to stay behind walls and closed doors. That's not our mandate. Christians are to be in the world, to build on everything that's positive, and to permeate all reality with Christian life and meaning. This is all true even now in the time of 'lockdown.' Again, we need to follow that example set by the apostles for us of prayer. Even as we long for that time to come again, as surely it will, when we can come together to pray, we can let the Holy Spirit lead us in new ways of praying by ourselves and with our families.

These will be gifts from the Spirit that we can take into the future. These will be ways in which we can now and in the future lift up our eyes to the Father and give glory to him. These will be the ways in which we come to see, as Jesus in the Gospel assures us today, that we belong to him and are precious to him.


A PRAYER IN TIME OF DANGER & ILLNESS


