## **SACRAMENTAL PROGRAMMES IN 2021**

**FIRST COMMUNION 2021**: Registration for First Communion in 2021 closed last Friday. Applications will now be considered for 2022. All Sacramental programmes in the Archdiocese of Liverpool are parish-based and therefore registration was necessary. In the last five years the parish has oversubscribed to printed material and therefore it is unfair to expect the parish to cover the costs of unused materials.

**CONFIRMATION:** The Sacrament of Confirmation for Year 8 children will be celebrated in the Parish next year. Enquiries and registration can be made at the Parish Office.

**ADULT CATECHESIS**: Adults (18 years of age plus tax) who feel called to live the Catholic Faith are invited to make enquiries with Fr. Kevin.

#### **REOPENING:**

Last Sunday we opened for public worship following a lengthy closure. For the most part all those attending followed the directives. However, a few people avoided using the hand gel sanitisers. This weekend, contact details will be taken at 11.00am Mass, so that there can be no confusion if there is a covid-19 case. It was hoped that if everyone followed the guidelines, this exercise could be avoided. Depending on its success it may be introduced at all Sunday Masses. There has also been some disquiet regarding the distribution of Holy Communion after Mass. No exceptions will be made in this regard until instruction is received from the Archdiocese based upon government directives. We are blessed to be open for Mass. Please be reminded that a one-way system is in operation in Church. When going to Holy Communion please avoid crossing through benches. This prevents any form of cross contamination.

**Face coverings:** Since Friday 24<sup>th</sup> July face coverings became obligatory and must be worn at all times in Church. Children and those with medical conditions who find it difficult to wear a mask are exempt.

**CLEANING PEWS:** Grateful thanks to the volunteers who sanitise the pews after each Mass.

## THOUGHT FOR THE DAY

"The disciple of the kingdom of heaven is like a householder who brings out from his storeroom things both old and new."

St. Matthew brings to an end his chapter of parables on the nature of the kingdom of heaven with two on perception and choice, and one on the resolution of confusion. Finally there is a summary on the qualities of the true disciple.

If we read the whole chapter of parables straight through, what strikes home is the complexity of the kingdom. It is not immediately available to all. It is like a seed. It grows from insignificance to grandeur. It produces a variety of crops, and it gets mixed up with weeds. Anyone in pursuit of it needs to be able to decide what is of true value and what can be either tolerated or discarded. The hidden treasure, or the pearl of great price, needs then to be pursued with total commitment. We have to be prepared to give up all that we have in order to get it.

The task of discernment is made more complicated by the fact that the world is a mixture of good and evil that often, to the undiscerning eye, resemble each other. For the most part we just have to live with the mixture, for the real sifting or separating out will only be done at the end of time.

The scribe who becomes a disciple is the one who combines the learning of the Old Testament with that of the New. The true follower of Christ can take out of the storeroom of both Testaments the learning which is appropriate to the needs of a situation. Matthew, ending his chapter of parables on this note, will now return to his concern of how to create a Church. One thing he has illustrated is the sort of discernment which is required in those who take on such a task.

We sometimes look for programmes that can be applied like steam rollers to eliminate all the potholes or like flat irons to get rid of all the creases. Matthew's chapter of parables shows the inappropriateness of this desire for simple solutions. It is also an aid to those who are trying to be Church. The world does not go away or change its nature.

It is for us to discover the creative links between our beliefs and its hard realities. For this we need the backing of the teaching of both Old and New Testaments. They will put us in touch with what is of true value.

We also need to be aware of the complexity of the world in which we live, where such values may not be immediately discernible. There is an ongoing struggle between different philosophies, from altruism to utilitarianism to hedonism, from internationalism to nationalism, from focus on the needs of people to focus on the needs of the environment.

We have to learn how to evaluate the different messages we hear, the different pressures that are put upon us. We have to learn to choose and to support our choices. We also have to learn to tolerate. We need the excitement of great collectors, able to spot real value when it emerges and be able to give of our time and energies to help that value grow. Sometimes we have to dive in with total commitment, at other times we have to wait and see.

Working for the kingdom is an awesome adventure. In the weeks to come the extracts from Matthew's gospel will give us further insight as to how we need to go about our task.

Dear Lord, help us to put all our trust in you knowing that we make these prayers through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

- 5. We pray to protect nature and the world around us. Help us focus our resources on taking care of our common home. Grant us your grace to lift our voices for lasting change so we may live tenderly on the earth. Lord hear us.
- 6. We pray for all Christians, as we mark the feast day of St James, let us all be travelling beacons of God's light and love. Let us hold the faith in unity of spirit and righteousness in life. Lord hear us.
- 7. Let us pray for the repose of the souls of those who have died recently and for those whose anniversaries occur at this time Fr. ## Cautious reopening of our churches for public worship.

#### Before vou arrive

You should avoid bringing any unnecessary items into church, e.g. shopping bags, as you will not be returning to your seat once you have received Holy Communion.

You should stay at home if you are unwell. People who are vulnerable or who feel unsure about returning to Mass need to consider the wisdom of doing so.

Remember the Sunday obligation has not been reinstated and livestreaming of Masses will continue.

You will need to bring your own face covering.

All people entering church must wear a face covering at all times.

## When you arrive

You will be welcomed by a volunteer steward and you may be asked to give your contact details.

You must adhere to social distancing guidelines in place.

Any children accompanying you must do the same.

Baskets will be available at the entrance (and exit) for your weekly envelopes or other contributions.

You will be directed to the hand sanitiser.

You will be directed to a bench. It may not be where you usually sit.

Toilets will remain closed at all times except for a genuine emergency.

The piety stall will be closed.

## **During Mass**

There will be no Sign of Peace.

There will be no singing.

## **Holy Communion:**

- Will be distributed after the final dismissal of the Mass.
- The words "The Body of Christ" and the reply "Amen" will only be said once at the beginning of distribution. They will not to be repeated for each person receiving Holy Communion.
- The volunteer stewards will direct you to approach the altar to receive Holy Communion.
- People receiving Communion will be instructed to approach the altar with their arms outstretched so as to maintain a reasonable distance from the minister.
- You may only receive the Sacred Host in your hand and not on your tongue.
- Communicants must avoid skin to skin contact with the minister's hands.
- You must then step to one side, lower your face covering and place the Sacred Host in your mouth the follow directions to leave the church immediately.

## **After Mass**

Use only the designated exit.

Please take home any newsletters, Mass sheets and other papers you may use.

Please do not gather in the church porch or on church property for conversations.

Continue to wear your face covering until you leave the area where other people are.
