Can I just say....

Over the weeks and months of lockdown, what have your really missed? Was it the pint down the pub, the odd meal out with friends, a trip to the theatre or cinema or even just a swim? Of course, alongside all those desires all of which I've probably felt at some time or other fairly recently, there is the need to remember that some people really have suffered quite badly during these extraordinary and sad times. Yes, there have been the people who have been ill. There have been the people who have died, whether with the virus or without, and their families who have not been able to give them the funeral they might always have expected. In the Gospel today, we'll find that sense of loss and bereavement too if we look. But we'll also find the consolation and the true satisfaction of all our desires, something that people are beginning to feel again now that we gradually and cautiously return to the celebration of Mass.

Saint Matthew's Gospel recalls the feeding of the five thousand, a story we'll find in all four Gospels. But notice how we begin our passage today with talk of the death of John the Baptist. John the Baptist's martyrdom must have had a tremendous impact on Jesus but Saint Matthew's account doesn't dwell on the emotions. We might notice, though, that Jesus is retreating with his disciples to be alone, maybe to mourn. Jesus begins by putting his disciples to the test by telling them to feed the vast crowd. But he takes the lead, taking what they have so that all may be fed. So Jesus may well still be mourning the death of his cousin, but his compassion is such that the sight of all these hungry, needy people moves him to love them and to help them. Jesus' gestures of taking the bread, blessing it, breaking it and giving it are described with the same verbs Saint Matthew uses to describe the same actions of Jesus at the Last Supper. More is being referred to here than the satisfaction of physical hunger. The clear Eucharistic overtones present in this account point to another type of hunger and another type of food: the hunger of the human spirit, the food that is God himself, really present in the Eucharist.

Saint Paul speaks in a different way about the same dependence of the human spirit on God, as great as any need for bodily nourishment. The experience of God's love is so great that nothing is capable of displacing it, not even "anguish or distress, or persecution or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword". Saint Paul says that not even death itself can dim the light of God's love. Tremendous words for a tremendous reality: if we only knew.

OUR CHURCH IS NOW OPEN FOR THE CELEBRATION OF MASS

It's been really good to be able to welcome even more people back to church for the celebration of Mass once again. As everyone will see, however, things are by no means back to normal. We're not back to how things were back in March. Please see more information about how we can come to Mass on the front page of the Liverpool South Pastoral Area website, or on a flyer inside a printed newsletter. You'll see that when we come to Mass, everyone attending must wear a face covering. You'll see lots of other information there too that applies to every church in the archdiocese that is able to open for Mass. Please bear in mind a few other things particular to our church. Please use our car park and please use the one way system for getting in and out of the car park. The capacity of our church is now around 50. This is severely restricted from what we are normally used to. We are so very grateful to all our volunteers who have helped to welcome people and use our church in new ways and are now even more needed helping people come to church for Mass in new ways too. *Please do consider if you could join the team of volunteers. If you would like to help by being a volunteer steward, please speak to one of the team at church.*

Owing to the severely restricted numbers, it may not be possible to allow all who wish to go to any particular Mass. Please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday to Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6 pm on Wednesday. Your household is defined as those you live with. They are the only people you will be able to sit next to in church before leaving a gap for others. The doors to church will open half an hour before Mass is due to begin. This should give an opportunity for some time for private prayer, but it is also intended to prevent there being too much queuing as people enter and wait to be seated by the stewards. Please try to be seated at least 5 minutes before Mass is due to begin. Do take a copy of the Saint Paul Sunday Missal if you haven't already, but hold onto it and keep on bringing it with you to Sunday Mass. Do not leave it behind on the bench or replace it on the shelf. There may be a possibility that more Masses will be celebrated both on Sunday and through the week but only if we know there are people who wish to come and we have enough volunteers to help.

In summary

To avoid disappointment, book your place in plenty of time especially for weekend Masses which book up quickly.

Wear a face covering in church.

Email the parish office in good time detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Please try to avoid the need to queue to enter church by arriving in good time Follow the one way systems.
