

Can I just say....

With all the programmes you see on television about antiques and people who restore old furniture, you might wonder if there's a market out there at all for new furniture. How far does this craze go back? We might think of the Regency and Queen Anne and all that, but if you'd seen the way the ancient Israelites treated a certain timber box you'd know it all went back much earlier than that. The timber box in question is the Ark of the Covenant, carried around the land of Israel in great state until King David thought that he ought to build a house suitable to cover it permanently, and his son, Solomon, got on with building the great Temple. They thought they'd better do something since this ark was not just any bit of furniture. The Ark of the Covenant, containing the two tablets of stone with the law Moses brought down from the top of Mount Sinai, was where the people of the Old Testament believed God's presence had chosen to dwell.

Saint John, recording his vision in the Book of the Apocalypse, rather confounds the conspiracy theorists in telling us that he has seen this long-thought lost item in heaven. But this revelation points to a deeper meaning. In the New Testament, the Ark of the Covenant is no longer a piece of furniture, but rather a person. Mary is the Ark of the Covenant because she welcomed Jesus within her; she welcomed within her the One who is the new and eternal Covenant, which culminated in the offering of his Body and his Blood: a body and blood received through Mary. We rightly invoke Our Lady in litanies as *Foederis Arca*, the Ark of God's presence, the Ark of the Covenant of love which God desired to establish with the whole of humanity, in Christ, once and for all.

Just like the timber box of old, this Ark of the Covenant went a-wandering the hills of Judah. Elizabeth exclaimed: "From the moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leaped for joy." Saint Luke uses the verb "skirtan", "to leap", the same verb we find in one of the ancient Greek translations of the Old Testament to describe the dancing of King David in front of the ark. In his mother's womb John the Baptist danced like David before the Ark of the Covenant; he recognized that Mary was the new Ark of the Covenant, before which the heart exults with joy, the Mother of God present in the world who does not keep this divine presence to herself but offers it, sharing the grace of God. Maybe we should do a bit of that sort of dancing before that presence of God which Mary bears and shows forth to us.

OUR CHURCH IS NOW OPEN FOR THE CELEBRATION OF MASS

It's been really good to be able to welcome even more people back to church for the celebration of Mass once again. The number of people coming to church for Mass has steadily increased over these last few weeks. As everyone will see, however, things are by no means back to normal. We're not back to how things were back in March. Please see more information about how we can come to Mass on the front page of the Liverpool South Pastoral Area website, or on a flyer inside a printed newsletter. You'll see that when we come to Mass, everyone attending must wear a face covering. You'll see lots of other information there too that applies to every church in the archdiocese that is able to open for Mass. Please bear in mind a few other things particular to our church. Please use our car park and please use the one way system for getting in and out of the car park. The capacity of our church is now around 50. This is severely restricted from what we are normally used to. We are so very grateful to all our volunteers who have helped to welcome people and use our church in new ways and are now even more needed helping people come to church for Mass in new ways too. *Please do consider if you could join the team of volunteers. If you would like to help by being a volunteer steward, please speak to one of the team at church.*

Owing to the severely restricted numbers, it may not be possible to allow all who wish to go to any particular Mass. Please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday to Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6 pm on Wednesday. Your household is defined as those you live with. They are the only people you will be able to sit next to in church before leaving a gap for others. The doors to church will open half an hour before Mass is due to begin. This should give an opportunity for some time for private prayer, but it is also intended to prevent there being too much queuing as people enter and wait to be seated by the stewards. Please try to be seated at least 5 minutes before Mass is due to begin. Do take a copy of the Saint Paul Sunday Missal if you haven't already, but hold onto it and keep on bringing it with you to Sunday Mass. Do not leave it behind on the bench or replace it on the shelf. There may be a possibility that more Masses will be celebrated both on Sunday and through the week but only if we know there are people who wish to come and we have enough volunteers to help. Please let us know you are coming as indicated above. The more we are aware of who is coming in advance, the better we can place people in church safely and ensure as many people can be seated as possible.

In summary

To avoid disappointment, book your place in plenty of time especially for weekend Masses which book up quickly.

Wear a face covering in church.

Email the parish office in good time detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Please try to avoid the need to queue to enter church by arriving in good time.

Follow the one way systems.
