Can I just say....

It's tough at the top! That's what they say. Still, Saint Peter might have wondered if he really was at the top of anything. Yes, Saint Peter received a charism. He received the gift of being the leader of the Church, as we heard in today's Gospel. The Lord said that the Church would be founded on the Rock, Peter. Isn't a rock that's stood on usually at the bottom, though? Yet still he couldn't really be walked all over. Like Eliakim of the first reading, Peter would have the keys to admit people into the presence of the Lord. It's clear in the Acts of the Apostles and in the Letters of Saint Paul that Peter was first among the apostles, among those called to proclaim Jesus' Good News. Peter took leadership in the Church at Pentecost. After the apostles, Our Lady and he received the Holy Spirit, Peter led everyone out to the Temple and began preaching the Good News to the people. After Saul's conversion from persecutor to promotor of the Church and after his years in the desert of Arabia, Paul then went to Jerusalem to receive Peter's blessing and commission to bring the Good News, the Gospel to the world.

All the apostles recognized that Peter was given the charism to lead the Church. And Peter realized that he had to take up his position of leadership at the centre of the then known world, Rome. We don't know how Peter got to Rome but we know he got there. There are stories that Paul consulted Peter in Rome. We know that Peter died in Rome, crucified head down. The excavations under the Basilica of Saint Peter revealed a tomb with the words, "Here Lies Peter", and the body of a large man of Palestinian origin. We also know that when Peter died, the charism he was given to lead the Church remained active in Rome. As time went on, these bishops of Rome would be given the title, Pope, Father of the Family, leader of the Church.

So what does all this mean to us? It means that the charism of Peter lives on in the Catholic Church. This leadership is experienced in the teaching of the Holy Father and the teaching authority of the Church. It means that we know who we are as Catholics. The charism of Peter remains in the Pope and in the Magisterium. The way we live our lives flows from our faith. But this leads us to know too that as human beings we need the help of God to be His Presence for others. The Church provides for us. We treasure the gift of the Eucharist entrusted to the apostles and their successors as the food we need for the journey of life.

OUR CHURCH IS NOW OPEN FOR THE CELEBRATION OF MASS

It's been really good to be able to welcome even more people back to church for the celebration of Mass once again. The number of people coming to church for Mass has steadily increased over these last few weeks. As everyone will see, however, things are by no means back to normal. We're not back to how things were back in March. Please see more information about how we can come to Mass on the front page of the Liverpool South Pastoral Area website, or on a flyer inside a printed newsletter. You'll see that when we come to Mass, everyone attending must wear a face covering. You'll see lots of other information there too that applies to every church in the archdiocese that is able to open for Mass. Please bear in mind a few other things particular to our church. Please use our car park and please use the one way system for getting in and out of the car park. The capacity of our church is now around 50. This is severely restricted from what we are normally used to. We are so very grateful to all our volunteers who have helped to welcome people and use our church in new ways and are now even more needed helping people come to church for Mass in new ways too. *Please do consider if you could join the team of volunteers. If you would like to help by being a volunteer steward, please speak to one of the team at church.*

Owing to the severely restricted numbers, it may not be possible to allow all who wish to go to any particular Mass. Please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday to Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6 pm on Wednesday. Your household is defined as those you live with. They are the only people you will be able to sit next to in church before leaving a gap for others. The doors to church will open half an hour before Mass is due to begin. This should give an opportunity for some time for private prayer, but it is also intended to prevent there being too much queuing as people enter and wait to be seated by the stewards. Please try to be seated at least 5 minutes before Mass is due to begin. Do take a copy of the Saint Paul Sunday Missal if you haven't already, but hold onto it and keep on bringing it with you to Sunday Mass. Do not leave it behind on the bench or replace it on the shelf. There may be a possibility that more Masses will be celebrated both on Sunday and through the week but only if we know there are people who wish to come and we have enough volunteers to help. Please let us know you are coming as indicated above. The more we are aware of who is coming in advance, the better we can place people in church safely and ensure as many people can be seated as possible.

In summary

To avoid disappointment, book your place in plenty of time especially for weekend Masses which book up quickly. If you have booked and cannot attend, please let the office know asap as some people are not turning up for Masses after previously booking.

Wear a face covering in church at all times.

Email the parish office in good time detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Please try to avoid the need to queue to enter church by arriving in good time.

Follow the one way systems.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Throughout the period of lockdown, the Sacrament of Reconciliation has only been available by appointment. As time has drawn on, more guidance and instructions have been received as to how this sacrament may be celebrated in these times. As well as making sure of the usual considerations of secrecy and the safeguarding of both the penitent and confessor, we now have to think about our physical safety and health too. The confessional room in our church is deemed too small and confined a space to be used as there would be insufficient ventilation and air flow. It now seems possible, however, to offer regular opportunities for the Sacrament of Reconciliation in the Parish Meeting Rooms. These times will be the usual Saturday afternoon slot before the evening Mass, 5.15 p.m. to 5.45 p.m., and in addition Wednesday morning before Mass, 8.45 a.m. to 9.15 a.m. Please follow the instructions you'll find as you arrive at the Meeting Rooms at these times. As on all other occasions and in other spaces, all surfaces and seats will be sanitised before and after use each time. Please do make use of these opportunities to receive and celebrate God's love, mercy and forgiveness.
