### Can I just say....

What's a guideline and what's the law? When will the police step in and when are people expected just to get on with following advice and playing their part? These questions are on the lips of many today with all that's going on, but similar questions have always been around in the life of the Church. Today's Gospel is part of what's sometimes called the "discourse on the Church". Jesus speaks here more directly about matters of Church discipline and order. In Saint Matthew's record of Jesus' teaching, we can hear echoes of the kinds of issues faced by the early Christian community. Jesus doesn't necessarily discourage disagreement within the community of the Church; he acknowledges the reality of conflict and error and offers his disciples a means for addressing such matters. It's in the conclusion to this teaching that the message of hope is found: Jesus is present with the community and will guide the community in its relations. If decisions are taken in prayer, then the community can be assured of God's assistance.

We might ask ourselves too: how much of my life is governed by "we" and how much is it governed by "me?" Whether we live with others or alone, we all need to see that all of life comes from God. We are made in God's image and likeness. Remember too that we say that God is a community of Persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each with his own characteristics but at the same time in mutual interdependency. Being excessively independent is not Godly. Many people, though, want to "go it alone." Theirs is a "me and God" religion and declare that their relationship with God is nobody else's business. The great danger is that they thereby make God over into their own image and likeness. But living with others isn't always easy either. Selfishness and the desire to control others can surface. Such was the case in early Christian communities. Such is still the case today. It is sad to see that sort of disagreement and criticism in Christian families and in the family that is the Church. Why would anyone want to join us in the Christian family if they see us relating to others in that way, tearing down rather than doing the building up to which we're called?

So really that's why we still need this discourse of Jesus on the Church and moreover why we need his Church. It's not just me and God. We need that Church that gives a loving criticism and continues to communicate to us the standards and norms for how we should behave that Jesus gives to us. That's why we need this Church that God gives to us so that we can live together in his love and in peace and justice together in God's family.

#### OUR CHURCH IS NOW OPEN FOR THE CELEBRATION OF MASS

It's been really good to be able to welcome even more people back to church for the celebration of Mass once again. The number of people coming to church for Mass has steadily increased over these last few weeks. As everyone will see, however, things are by no means back to normal. We're not back to how things were back in March. Please see more information about how we can come to Mass on the front page of the Liverpool South Pastoral Area website, or on a flyer inside a printed newsletter. You'll see that when we come to Mass, everyone attending must wear a face covering. You'll see lots of other information there too that applies to every church in the archdiocese that is able to open for Mass. Please bear in mind a few other things particular to our church. Please use our car park and please use the one way system for getting in and out of the car park. The capacity of our church is now around 50. This is severely restricted from what we are normally used to. We are so very grateful to all our volunteers who have helped to welcome people and use our church in new ways and are now even more needed helping people come to church for Mass in new ways too. Please do consider if you could join the team of volunteers. If you would like to help by being a volunteer steward, please speak to one of the team at church.

Owing to the severely restricted numbers, it may not be possible to allow all who wish to go to any particular Mass. *Please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday to Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6 pm on Wednesday.* Your household is defined as those you live with. They are the only people you will be able to sit next to in church before leaving a gap for others. The doors to church will open half an hour before Mass is due to begin. This should give an opportunity for some time for private prayer, but it is also intended to prevent there being too much queuing as people enter and wait to be seated by the stewards. Please try to be seated at least 5 minutes before Mass is due to begin. Do take a copy of the Saint Paul Sunday Missal if you haven't already, but hold onto it and keep on bringing it with you to Sunday Mass. Do not leave it behind on the bench or replace it on the shelf. There may be a possibility that more Masses will be celebrated both on Sunday and through the week but only if we know there are people who wish to come and we have enough volunteers to help. Please let us know you are coming as indicated above. The more we are aware of who is coming in advance, the better we can place people in church safely and ensure as many people can be seated as possible.

#### In summary

To avoid disappointment, book your place in plenty of time especially for weekend Masses which book up quickly. If you have booked and cannot attend, please let the office know asap as some people are not turning up for Masses after previously booking.

Wear a face covering in church at all times.

Email the parish office in good time detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Please try to avoid the need to queue to enter church by arriving in good time.

Follow the one way systems.

#### The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Taking into account all that we need to do for the safe celebration of this sacrament, including the need for good ventilation in the room in which it happens, there are now regular opportunities for the Sacrament of Reconciliation in the Parish Meeting Rooms. These times will be the usual Saturday afternoon slot before the evening Mass, 5.15 p.m. to 5.45 p.m., and in addition Wednesday morning before Mass, 8.45 a.m. to 9.15 a.m. Please do follow the instructions you'll find as you arrive at the Meeting Rooms at these times and make use of these opportunities to receive and celebrate God's love, mercy and forgiveness.

#### The Sacrament of Baptism

Since church has reopened for Mass and other liturgies, it has also been a joy to see a number of children baptised. The parents of these children attended their preparation before April and have waited a long time but, as with everything else at the moment, these celebrations have been restricted in some ways. At this time, only the parents, godparents, grandparents and siblings of the child being baptised may attend the celebration in our church.

It is now possible to begin again offering preparation for parents who have a child to be baptised but in different ways. If you have a child to be baptised, please contact the office and the details of this preparation can be explained to you.
