Saint of the week. Saint Andrew Apostle. 30th November 2020

He was born in Bethsaida, in Galilee, Israel, and worked as a fisherman. He may have been a disciple of St John the Baptist. He became one of the first to follow Jesus and introduced his brother, Simon Peter, to him. He was martyred in Patras, Achaia [Greece] in AD 60.

As one of the twelve Apostles he was widely venerated in ancient times in the Orthodox churches he is called the "First Called" or "The First Chosen". St. Jerome records that Andrew's relics were taken from Patras (Pátrai) to Constantinople (Istanbul) by command of the Roman emperor Constantius II in 357. From there, the body was taken to Amalfi, Italy (church of Sant'Andrea), in 1208, and in the 15th century the head was taken to Rome (St. Peter's Basilica, Vatican City).

He became patron saint of Scotland because according to legend some of his bones were brought there and buried at the place where the town of St Andrew's now stands. In September 1964 Pope Paul VI returned Andrew's head to Pátrai as a gesture of goodwill toward the separated Christians of Greece.

He is the Patron Saint of Fishermen

A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

You, Lord, yourself are our Father, 'Our Redeemer' is your ancient name. Why, Lord, leave us to stray from your ways and harden our hearts against fearing you? Gospel Mark 13:33-37

If he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Be on your guard, stay awake, because you never know when the time will come. It is like a man travelling abroad: he has gone from home, and left his servants in charge, each with his own task; and he has told the doorkeeper to stay awake. So stay awake, because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, midnight, cockcrow, dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep. And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!'

The Gospel of the Lord. **Thought for Today.** "Stay awake!"

Twenty-nine centuries ago, the Greek poet Homer wrote what was really a thriller. It was about a king, Odysseus, who went from his island home to the wars and was away for nineteen years. His wife, Penelope, feared he was dead, though hoping he was still alive, and meanwhile she was pestered by extravagant young noblemen who each wanted to be her second husband. But one "rosy-fingered dawn" (to quote Homer) Odysseus did come home, over the "wine-dark sea", and smuggled himself into his own palace as a stranger. The one who recognised him was his old nurse. She was washing his poor feet, and came across a scar that she knew only too well. She raised her eyes to his face, and knew without doubt that the king was home again. What followed was not pretty – the wiping-out of the young noblemen and their corrupt companions, and the restoration of justice.

Jesus tells us to stay awake, because the master of the house is coming back; and by this he means that he, Jesus, is coming back. The day will come when we raise our eyes to his face and recognise him. He loves us too much to stay away for ever. When he does come, it will be too late to make preparations and clear up the mess. For better or worse, the king will be home again. It will be a moment of intense happiness for us, but also cause for a certain apprehension, because he is coming as judge. He will judge individually – that will happen when we die – but he will also pronounce judgement on the world and the human race. The appalling things we seem to be unable to control, like human trafficking and drug trafficking, like genocide and the abuse of children, like destruction of the environment and the creation of millions of refugees... all these things will come under his scrutiny. "You didn't stay awake," perhaps he will say. "You carried on as though I was never coming back. Well, here I am."

After the delivery of the last judgement, no one will be able to say, "Oh, but that's not fair!", because it will be fair. There will be no place for political argument or shifting of the blame; crime on a cosmic scale will be identified and judgement will be made. Isaiah describes it in our first reading today: "We were all like men unclean... We have all withered like leaves and our sins blew us away like the wind." Jesus' words in today's Gospel were spoken on the Mount of Olives, overlooking Jerusalem. If his words sound alarming, even threatening, the threat was in the first place to the holy city and the Temple. This threat came true not long afterwards, when the Romans sacked and destroyed Jerusalem. The early Christians saw this as a sign that the last judgement was imminent. Well, the moment will come when the last judgement is now. We are so used to imagining it in the dim and misty future: one day it will be upon us.

The moral of the tale is: we are to take responsibility for planetary issues, not just small-scale personal ones. We cannot close our eyes to the state of the earth and what is happening on its surface. We are called to raise our voices and demand decency and justice, and proper stewardship of the world's resources. We do this because we are not just insignificant insects in a global setting; we are, as Isaiah says, the clay with which the Lord fashions his masterpiece, men and women, the human race, capable of better.

St Luke relays the same teaching of Jesus, about the master returning home from a wedding and finding his servants awake and ready to open up and receive him. The master will be so pleased, says Jesus in this version, that he will sit all his household down at table and wait upon them. That's the good side of the last judgement; the Lord who is judge is also the Lord who loves us

beyond measure. Today we can pray to this Lord of love, asking him to help us to stay awake, to be sorry for our failings in the past, to care about the things that really matter. In the words of today's Psalm: "And we shall never forsake you again: give us life that we may call upon your name."

"Lord, you are our Father; we the clay, you the potter, we are all the work of your hand." On this first Sunday in Advent and conscious of your love for each one of us, we place ourselves and our prayers entirely in your hands.

- 5. Let us pray for the many refugees and asylum seekers who are willing to risk their lives in the search for security and freedom. May they meet with compassion and understanding in their time of crisis.
- 6. Let us pray for ourselves and all those whom we know and love as we start our Advent journey towards Christmas. May we follow the Star of Bethlehem and allow Jesus to be born in our hearts.
- 7. 
