### **Can I just say....**

Better the devil you know' and 'familiarity breeds contempt' are phrases we might well hear around us often. Which is true? Are they both true at different times and in different places? Maybe Jesus' own experiences show us that. He's in his home town in the Gospel today and people think they know who he is. But Saint Mark points out that the real question they should be asking themselves, as we ourselves should too, is: Who *really* is Jesus? The people of Nazareth might know the carpenter, the son of Mary, but they don't know Jesus, the Son of God. Mark is foreshadowing Jesus' rejection by his own people, the people of Israel. He's also reflecting on and trying to explain the situation of the community for which he wrote. While many of the first Christians were Jewish, Christianity took hold and flourished in the Gentile community. Mark's community was mostly a Gentile community, who may have been experiencing persecution. By showing that Jesus himself was rejected, Mark consoles and reassures his first readers and prepares us to accept this possible consequence of Christian discipleship for ourselves. We reflect and rejoice today that we are disciples because we're baptised with a baptism that makes us prophets like Christ, sharing in the prophecy of Jesus in our home country and abroad too. Even though the exercise of this mission does not bring us honour, comfort, and recognition, we must continue to exercise it. This is because, even in our weakness, the grace of God is sufficient for us, and makes us strong.

Like Ezekiel, each one of us as a Christian has a mission from God, but a mission to where? We need to see that there's need for mission everywhere right now. There's mission in our families, in our communities, and in our world at large. There is much rebellion in our time against God, against nature and against divine institutions. This rebellion may well take the form of our personal sins, but it might just as likely take the form of the structures of sin we see around us in our society and this we are missioned to address too.

Are we the ones who rebel or are we the ones who accept the mission? In coming to accept the mission we received at Baptism, really we need to see whose mission it is anyway. This is God's mission to the world, bringing his Good News and he entrusts it to us. We don't preach ourselves but rather Christ crucified. We may feel afraid but the grace of God is sufficient for us. So, if we are willing, God will fill us with this grace always such that people around us may say, "Where did this person get all this? What is this wisdom granted to him or her?"

# St Francis of Assisi Church ST FRANCIS IS OPEN FOR MASS FROM WEDNESDAY, 2nd DECEMBER

It will be really good to be able to welcome people back to church for the celebration of Mass. However, things are by no means back to normal—we're not back to how things were back in March. For more information about how we can come to Mass, see the front page of the Liverpool South Pastoral Area website. Everyone attending Mass must wear a face covering. You'll see lots of other information there too that applies to every church in the archdiocese that is able to open for Mass. Please bear in mind a few other things particular to our church. Please use our car park and follow the one way system for getting in and out of the car park. The capacity of our church is now about 50. This is severely restricted from normal. We are very grateful to all our volunteers who have helped to welcome people and use our church in new ways and are now even more needed by helping people come to church for Mass in new ways too. Please do consider joining the volunteer team. If you would like to help stewarding, please speak to one of the team at church.

Owing to the severely restricted numbers, it may not be possible to allow all who wish to attend, to go to the Mass of their choice. Please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday - Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6pm on Wednesday. Your household is defined as those you live with. These are the only people you will be able to sit next to in church before leaving a gap for others.

The church doors will open half an hour before Mass giving time for private prayer, and preventing queues as people enter and wait to be seated by the stewards. Please be seated at least 5 minutes before Mass.

Do take a copy of the *Saint Paul Sunday Missal* if you haven't already, but keep it to bring to Sunday Mass. Do not leave it behind or place it on the shelf. There may be a possibility that more Masses will be celebrated on Sundays and through the week if we know there is a demand and we have enough volunteers. **The more we are aware of who is coming, the better we can place people in church safely and ensure as many as possible can be seated as possible.** 

Book your place in early especially for weekend Masses which fill up quickly. If you book and cannot attend, please let the office know asap so others can be accommodated.

Email the parish office detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Wear a face covering in church at all times.

Please avoid the queue to enter church by arriving in good time.

Follow the one way systems.

### THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

Following the latest guidance received recently from the government and the archbishop, the number of people able to at celebration of Baptism may increase after 17<sup>th</sup> May. This is subject to the government moving the country to that step on the roadmap out of lockdown by that date.

The parents, siblings, grandparents and godparents of child to be baptised will be allowed to attend. No more people will be able to attend at this time.

Parents who have completed the Baptism preparation course and need to rearrange a date for their child's baptism should contact the parish office to do that. Parents who have not completed a Baptism preparation course, after which a date for baptism may be arranged, should contact the parish office to do that.

In order to support the NHS Test and Trace programme, we are taking

<u>Dr Gemma Simmonds</u> is a sister of the Congregation of Jesus. An honorary fellow of Durham University and past president of the Catholic Theological Association of Great Britain, she has studied at the universities of Paris, London, Rio de Janeiro and Cambridge, where she undertook a doctorate in theology.

After a career in secondary teaching Gemma worked as chaplain in the Universities of Cambridge and London. Returning from study and missionary work among women and street children in Brazil in 1992, she was a volunteer chaplain in Europe's largest women's prison, HMP Holloway, until its closure in 2016. She was a senior lecturer in Pastoral Theology at Heythrop College, University of London, teaching and researching in the fields of theology of religious life, Christian spirituality, ecclesiology and Catholic education. Gemma is also a simultaneous translator and interpreter in four languages and a regular broadcaster on religious programmes for the BBC & other media.

In 2018 Gemma joined the Margaret Beaufort Institute as director of the Religious Life Institute [RLI], founded at Heythrop College in 2007. She also teaches courses in Christian spirituality. Her most recent book, The Way of Ignatius, was published by SPCK in 2018 and featured as the online Lent retreat for Pray As You Go www.pray-as-you-go.org on Android and iOS apps.

<u>Fr Dominic Curran</u>, whom you may know, who was ordained in 2009 for the Archdiocese of Liverpool and has had a varied ministry as a priest, serving in several parishes and hospitals. He has been a chaplain in multiple Hospital Trusts both acute care and mental health and is a youth coach chaplain on the Archdiocesan Lourdes Pilgrimage. He is currently Parish Priest of Saint Oscar Romero Parish in Seaforth and Waterloo.
