Can I just say....

When we hear the word 'calling', or even the word 'vocation', the word story is bound not to be too far behind. But then, why should we be surprised. Throughout the Scriptures there are plenty of good stories and many of them are about an individual's vocation from God. All three of our readings today present to us three people who have received a call from God to undertake a specific ministry at his service. Isaiah's experience of being called which we hear in the first reading could be said to be a little unpleasant, maybe even downright dangerous! Having a hot, burning coal put on your tongue is certainly not the most pleasant of experiences, I would guess. The point is, of course, that Isaiah's lips were cleansed by this experience so that he could go on to answer God's call, be purified and be a prophet.

Saint Paul's life before what we've come to know as his conversion could be said to have been somewhat characterised by violence, a violence towards the very people he would go on to serve. The life that Paul was leading when he was writing his letters to the churches, like the one in Corinth, must have seemed very different to the life he was leading years before when persecuting those on the Christian Way. And Saint Paul is certainly aware of his past, so much so that he thinks he's hardly worthy of the title 'apostle' but that is the ministry and mission to which he was called by the Lord.

There's another man we hear of today who seems to think himself unworthy: Simon Peter. "Leave me, Lord: I am a sinful man," he says. Jesus seems to say, however, that he won't get out of it that easily. I think we see here that Peter himself saw his life being very different after his meeting Jesus to how he saw it before. And I think that had to do with more than going from catching fish for profit to catching women and men for the Lord. He had to endure something quite demanding to get to the position whereby he could answer the call. He had to place all the trust and hope he'd ever had in the Lord and listen to him telling him to pay out the nets when this seemed quite a useless enterprise. This could have left him quite vulnerable, quite open to accusations of stupidity as well as unworthiness. But he trusts in the Lord and that same Lord really does provide all that's needed. We're called to the same trust in the Lord because God provides. God does the getting ready. God gives us what we need in order for us to be who God calls us to be. That's the story well worth telling.

Updated guidance on the use of our church building in light of the changes from Thursday, 27th January 2022

Due to the fact that the pandemic is far from over, the Bishops' Conference of England & Wales do not intend to restore an obligation to attend Sunday Mass at this point. However, they wish to remind us all of the importance of keeping Sunday holy and if possible attending Mass weekly.

After the legal changes to Covid regulations come in to force on Thursday, 22nd January, the following is what will be required in the churches of the Archdiocese of Liverpool.

Face coverings are strongly recommended to be worn by those who are present in a church building. (Exemptions for medical reasons excluded.)

Social distancing will not be mandatory in our churches.

Hand sanitising will remain necessary as people arrive and the sanitiser will remain available for use on the way out.

There will, however, be a section of the benches reserved for those who would feel safer and less vulnerable by maintaining social distancing in church. Benches reserved for this purpose will give a limited number of spaces for those who wish to continue social distancing. Only if you would like one of the spaces in a bench reserved for social distancing will you be asked to contact the office. If you would like to reserve a socially-distanced place or places, please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday - Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6pm on Wednesday. A socially-distanced place cannot be guaranteed for those who have not booked that place in the way outlined above.

At Sunday Masses, and other Masses and liturgies that are well attended, stewards will continue to guide people out of their benches to come forward to receive Holy Communion. At Mass during the week, people may come forward to receive Communion without being directed. The sign of peace may now be reintroduced and people may use holy water at the entrance to church to bless themselves as a reminder of their baptism.

We must be grateful to all the stewards for their hard work over a long period of time. Their work will now continue but in different ways as they help us to keep our church a safe place to visit and use. New volunteers to help steward will always be welcome and will greatly help our current team, so please think about offering your help in that way. We can, though, all help and play our part to keep our church safe, especially by continuing to keep our face coverings on.

Only book your place early if you require a socially-distanced place.
If you book and cannot attend, please let the office know A.S.A.P. so others can be accommodated.
These places will be limited and cannot be guaranteed for those who turn up without booking.
Email the parish office detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Wear a face covering in church at all times.

Universal Synod on Synodality

Submissions: 10 January 2022 – 10 March 2022

Universal Synod 2023: Archbishop Malcolm is calling us to take part in the listening phase of the Universal Synod on synodality 2023, which Pope Francis has invited the whole Church to join. Although we have already engaged with the synodal process in the archdiocese as part of Synod 2020, which initially generated 27,000 responses, we may find ourselves in a different place on our journey. This may include fresh insights, which will be submitted to the Bishops' Conference together with the summary of the listening phases of Synod 2020. To participate in this world wide listening process, you can access and download the discussion questions from Monday 10 January 2022, as well as submit your responses online at www.liverpoolcatholicresources.com/synod2023. 
