Can I just say....

Saint Bernadette once said that she wasn't tasked with making people believe her. All she was asked to do by the Lady was tell the priests what she'd been told. That may have been true for that particular young girl with that particular message and mission, but for us as disciples of the Son of the Lady, we have both to believe and tell others. This Sunday we hear some of the most difficult teachings of Jesus. Why would we believe it or accept it? Jesus teaches us how to be faithful to God. He also teaches us a wisdom that can't be dismissed as simply human wisdom, thinking that we have better wisdom today because we life in a different age, we have a deeper understanding of human psychology, or we're more aware of the diversity of the human family. Despite how hard the teaching may be for us to accept sometimes, we have to accept that what Jesus teaches stands in the tradition of divine Wisdom which we can trace through the pages of Scripture.

There are several similarities between Luke's and Matthew's report of Jesus' great teaching, beginning with the Beatitudes, be they proclaimed from a mountain top or on a plain. There are, however, differences in language and nuance but perhaps it's another difference we might focus on this week: terminology. In Luke, Jesus contrasts the behaviour of his followers with the behaviour of "sinners." In Matthew, Jesus contrasts the behaviour desired with the behaviour of tax collectors and Gentiles. Matthew concludes the teaching about love of enemies with the admonition to be perfect as God is perfect; Luke concludes by emphasizing God's mercy.

In both Gospels, Jesus' words challenge those who would follow him to be more like God. God loves us beyond our expectations, beyond anything we can possibly imagine. In response to God's love, we are to love as God loves, beyond expectations and with a depth beyond imagining. Jesus tells us, "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you." We might at first think: "Nobody lives that way." But we're invited rather to think, "How can I live this way because Jesus has called me to live this way." Saint Paul tells the Corinthians and us in our second reading what will be the consequences of us following this teaching of Jesus to live in the way of mercy and forgiveness: we will then bear not only the image of the first man (Adam) but also the image of Jesus Christ. Believe and tell others about what we have: discipleship may well be hard, a struggle and a challenge, but we are assured: "For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you."

Updated guidance on the use of our church building in light of the changes from Thursday, 27th January 2022

Due to the fact that the pandemic is far from over, the Bishops' Conference of England & Wales do not intend to restore an obligation to attend Sunday Mass at this point. However, they wish to remind us all of the importance of keeping Sunday holy and if possible attending Mass weekly.

After the legal changes to Covid regulations come in to force on Thursday, 22nd January, the following is what will be required in the churches of the Archdiocese of Liverpool.

Face coverings are strongly recommended to be worn by those who are present in a church building. (Exemptions for medical reasons excluded.)

Social distancing will not be mandatory in our churches.

Hand sanitising will remain necessary as people arrive and the sanitiser will remain available for use on the way out.

There will, however, be a section of the benches reserved for those who would feel safer and less vulnerable by maintaining social distancing in church. Benches reserved for this purpose will give a limited number of spaces for those who wish to continue social distancing. Only if you would like one of the spaces in a bench reserved for social distancing will you be asked to contact the office. If you would like to reserve a socially-distanced place or places, please contact the parish office, preferably by email, to let us know which Mass you would like to attend and how many in your household wish to come. For Masses Monday - Friday, please contact us at least 2 days before the Mass you wish to attend. For all

Masses on Saturday and Sunday, please contact us by 6pm on Wednesday. A socially-distanced place cannot be guaranteed for those who have not booked that place in the way outlined above.

At Sunday Masses, and other Masses and liturgies that are well attended, stewards will continue to guide people out of their benches to come forward to receive Holy Communion. At Mass during the week, people may come forward to receive Communion without being directed. The sign of peace may now be reintroduced and people may use holy water at the entrance to church to bless themselves as a reminder of their baptism.

We must be grateful to all the stewards for their hard work over a long period of time. Their work will now continue but in different ways as they help us to keep our church a safe place to visit and use. New volunteers to help steward will always be welcome and will greatly help our current team, so please think about offering your help in that way. We can, though, all help and play our part to keep our church safe, especially by continuing to keep our face coverings on.

Only book your place early if you require a socially-distanced place. If you book and cannot attend, please let the office know A.S.A.P. so others can be accommodated. These places will be limited and cannot be guaranteed for those who turn up without booking. Email the parish office detailing which Mass you wish to attend and how many people will be present with you.

Please wear a face covering in church at all times.
