CRIMINAL JUSTICE BILL

The Archbishop wishes to draw attention to the fact that, from the end of February, it is likely that the Criminal Justice Bill will return to Parliament, and that amendments will be tabled to decriminalize abortion up to the point of birth. As well as constituting a direct attack on the dignity of the unborn, these amendments (if passed) could have unforeseen and very serious consequences for both unborn babies and their mothers, given the increase in home abortions following the legalization of providing abortion pills by post. It is possible that there will be other amendments more favourable to the rights of unborn babies. Postcards which enable us to contact our members of Parliament on this subject are available in the church porch.

"FAITH UNDER STRESS" & "A GLIMPSE OF HEAVEN"

A faith enrichment opportunity for the season of Lent will be offered in the Meeting Room (upstairs) on the first three Mondays in March, beginning at 7.00 pm. A DVD recording will be played at each session, followed by time for the sharing of thoughts and impressions.

Session 1 on 4 March : FAITH UNDER STRESS – THE ELIZABETHAN ERA

A historical view of Catholic life in Lancashire at the time of the Reformation.

Sessions 2 & 3 on 11 & 18 March : A GLIMPSE OF HEAVEN

The story of how the Catholic Church in England survived after the Reformation, seem through the lens of the developing architecture of churches. From the late 18th century onwards, there was an explosion of church building which continued for 200 years. It ranged from the imperious Gothic of Pugin to the Byzantine magnificence of Westminster Cathedral, or from a simple village church in Cumberland to the modernism of our own cathedral. The story ends with a triumphant return to the Classical style at Brentwood Cathedral : the last important Catholic commission in Britain.
